- Of course nice weather brings bike riders out. Everyone needs to be aware of the Pennsylvania's bike laws and our responsibilities as riders. These laws, when obeyed, can help to prevent an accident. Bike laws are similar to those safety rule for automobiles.
- Ride on the right side of the road
- Stop at stop signs
- Signal when making a right or left turn
- ■Pedestrians (walkers) have the right away
- ■Bike helmets—Pennsylvania requires any person under the age of 12 riding a bicycle as an operator or passenger, to wear a protective bike helmet.

Code Enforcement Just a couple of reminders now that summer is here:

- Grass should not be more than six inches high and clippings should not be thrown into the street.
- Air conditioners should not be plugged into extension cords. Plug them straight into the outlet and make sure the filters and air conditioner is clean.

Garbage should always be placed in bags then the bags should be placed in containers, such as a covered garbage can. Garbage is not to be put out before 6 p.m. the night before pick up.

That fact got me thinking about future graduating classes and that we will not have a graduating class free of the pandemic experience until 2031. That is sobering, but also as a reminder that our efforts to overcome the challenges of the pandemic years are not over. So, this is a shout out to all the families and all of the staff members who have done yoeman's work to persevere and thrive. I have seen many individual

accomplishments and accolades in the last year, too many to list, but a couple of things stand out for me. First, the Gateway School District achieved an A- grade in the annual Niche ratings of school districts, placing us 21st in the entire greater Pittsburgh area. Schoolhouse Create a Legacy....The Genesis Advisory Board is excited about the progress of the Schoolhouse restoration on 6th Street. The exterior is 90% complete and they are working hard to generate donations for the interior. They are excited to announce the potential collaboration with the Monroeville Public Library. The Board has been in discussions with the Monroeville Public Library to offer programs and resources, such as computer/internet usage, after school programs, senior activities, craft sessions and employment coaching. In addition to the library/community center housed in the School-

house, the Advisory Board is raising funds to establish the James R. Fox Sr. Historical Society which includes the PHS Alumni, an Arts and Cultural Center and retail space. The anticipated funding needed for Phase I (first floor) is \$250,000. The Board has identified funding resources, such as classroom and display naming rights, adopt-a-window, and legacy donations. General donations such as buy-a-brick program, names on restored chalkboards and benches are also welcomed. It is with the help of the community that Genesis will see this vision come to reality. The Advisory Board is open to discussions with entrepreneurs looking for unique space as we begin the restoration of The Schoolhouse.


